My Background






Understand who you work for: Political representatives of the public in a local democracy.

- Councils are made up of.... authors, realtors, photographers, broadcasters, business owners, engineers, bus drivers, caregivers, medical professionals, volunteers, community organization directors, insurance brokers....
- Strong community involvement
- Often not technical experts
- Frequently, councillor is a second job.

Understand yourself:

- How do you feel about hierarchy, power and ownership?
- What motivates you?
- How do you feel about compromise, trust, transparency?













WHERE THE MONEY COMES FROM

Local Government - Large vs. Small


Factors for success:

- Listen to the people who have been there a long time




Local Government – Large vs. Small

Getting Things Done

Getting things done:


- Use data but know when it isn't enough
- Watch for opportunities
- Help others, including consultants, finish on schedule
- Be honest and open with the public
- Build good relationships internally
- Connect with but don't align with external community players
- Manage risk but not so much that it stifles good ideas
- Listen for "institutional memory"



Getting Things Done

Getting things done (cont'd):

- You can lead from only so far ahead...
- Steep learning curves
- Innovate to save time/money
- Clear, concise funding apps
- Understand political (and community) values and goals and fit your story into that
- Avoid idealism; appreciate being part of a local democratic political process
- Try to find power and ownership wherever you are and whatever your position



Getting Things Done

So how can CEA help?

- Research initiatives like Getting to Implementation that help identify barriers and ways to overcome them
- Partnerships with other stakeholders and utilities
- Connections with like-minded colleagues across BC/Canada to share experiences, brainstorm solutions
- Link report recommendations to:
 - strategic priorities, to help institutionalize & embed initiatives
 - external resources and upcoming opportunities
- Help create internal linkages, ongoing processes and useful messaging
- Always keep economic development (and cost savings) in mind
- Offer to make presentations to council
- Connect with all local government organizations (UBCM, LGMA, etc.)
- Continue to grow the role of the BC Mayors Climate Leadership Council to create top-down momentum
